

## 2013 Session Legislative Wrap-Up – Higher Education

(Report prepared as of 7/1/2013)

The 2013 session (1<sup>st</sup> regular session) of the 120<sup>th</sup> South Carolina General Assembly adjourned on Thursday, June 6, under the provisions of the *Sine Die* Resolution, [S.744](#). The 2013 session marks the end of the first year of the two-year continuing session. Legislation that was not enacted as of the end of the session carries over into the upcoming 2014 session which convenes on January 14, 2014.

The following provides summary information on the FY 2013-14 budget, Appropriations Act ([H.3710](#)) and Capital Reserve Fund Bill ([H.3711](#)), and on legislation relating to higher education considered or passed during the 2013 session.

### FY 2013-14 APPROPRIATIONS

#### *Higher Education appropriations in the Appropriations Act and the Capital Reserve Fund Bill*

The General Assembly submitted the FY 2013-14 budget, Appropriations Act and Capital Reserve Fund Bill (CRF), to the Governor on June 20, 2013. The Governor issued her veto messages on the budget bills on June 25. For copies of the Governor's veto messages, [Click Here for H.3710](#) and [Click Here for H.3711](#). The House returned on June 26 to take up the vetoes and the Senate on June 27. Of the 81 total items vetoed, six related to higher education funding (H.3710 veto numbers 1, 53, 54, and 69 and H.3711 veto numbers 6,8, and 9) and were overturned, with the exception of veto #1 concerning an item totaling \$25,000 for Student Legislature under the SC Tuition Grants budget.

The report below provides a summary overview of the FY 2013-14 budget for higher education as of the conclusion of the House and Senate consideration of vetoes.

Overall, the FY 2013-14 budget includes a total for higher education of just over \$885 million for higher education in State General Funds, non-recurring, Lottery, and CRF funds. The total includes higher education funding under CHE (including scholarship and grant programs), Tuition Grants, State Technical College System Office, and the 33 public colleges and universities.

The total higher education funding in FY 2013-14 is down by just over \$11 million, or 1%, as compared to FY 2012-13. The decrease is attributable to lower non-recurring (one-time) funding. Included is \$9.8 million in recurring funding (\$9.3 million in new allocations and \$500,000 retained per amended proviso 118.9), \$32.9 million in non-recurring and CRF, and \$263 million in lottery funds.

(1) Higher Education total includes CHE, funding that flows through CHE to higher education entities and for scholarships and grants, Public Institutions, State Technical College System, AHEC, and Tuition Grants. Funds directed to Clemson PSA, SC State PSA, and MUSC Hospital Authority are not included.

(2) Part 1A Recurring for FY13 is the beginning base minus deduction of \$460,075 for the transfer of funds required per Part 1B Proviso 90.13 in FY13. For FY 14, the proviso is continued (see Proviso 118.9, SR: Prohibits Public Funded Lobbyist), but the transfer of funds is not required. FY14 does not include, if any, BCB pay/health adjustment. A pay raise was not provided for state employees in FY14.

Merit-based (Palmetto Fellows, LIFE and HOPE)	The General Assembly continues to fully fund the state's undergraduate merit-based scholarship programs for anticipated growth. Funding totals \$228.3 million for these programs.
Need-based (CHE Need-based, SC Tuition Grants)	After receiving a one-time boost of \$4 million in the prior year, total grant funding for Need-based Grants is down by \$2.6 million. Tuition Grants (need-based grants for students at independent institutions) also received a one-time increase in the prior year of \$1.5 million. For FY 2013-14, increased recurring funds of \$1,622,184 and increased lottery funding over the base resulted in a net program increase of \$380,844 for Tuition Grants.
Lottery Tuition Assistance (LTA)	Level funding, as requested, of \$49.1 million is provided.
National Guard College Assistance Program (SCNG CAP)	Program funding was increased by \$2,545,000 to enable the program to serve on an annual basis the number of members participating last fall. Total funding is \$4,634,968.

### Other Lottery Funded Higher Education Programs

PASCAL (Higher Education Electronic Library)	PASCAL is included at \$1.5 million as the second item in the list of initiatives to be funded with any excess unclaimed prize funds. Funding may be received after the first \$11.3 million (\$8 million in certified and \$3.3 million in uncertified for the first priority, new school buses). Last year PASCAL was listed as the first priority after funding of \$12.4 million in certified unclaimed prize funds and is anticipated to receive less than \$50,000 for FY 2012-13 as of this report.
SmartState (Endowed Chairs)	For the seventh year, no new annual funding is provided.
Higher Education Excellence Enhancement Program (HEEEP)	\$3,480,795, an increase of \$978,053 over FY 2012-13. HEEEP is allocated to historically black colleges and universities pursuant to §2-77-10, <i>et seq.</i> Funds are allocated equally to the state's six four-year HBCUs and in FY 2013-14 to Columbia College and Converse College, which are added again with the inclusion of Part 1B Proviso 11.15.

### Commission on Higher Education (CHE)

CHE requested recurring funds for support of its core mission responsibilities for academic program quality. An increase of Part 1A funds of \$175,000 was provided.

As noted above, funds requested by CHE to enable participation at existing levels for the year for SREB contract programs and for the SCNG CAP program were also provided.

Other new funding provided includes funds that flow through CHE's budget to the University of Greenville. In addition to recurring funding that is provided, the University Center will receive \$200,000 in one-time funds in FY 2013-14 for Infrastructure Development through Proviso 118.17.

#### OTHER LEGISLATIVE ITEMS OF INTEREST DURING THE SESSION

CHE Appointment: Brigadier General John Finan appointed by the Governor as Chair of the Commission on Higher Education for a term commencing July 1, 2012 to July 1, 2016. The appointment was confirmed by the Senate on June 6.

Senate Finance Committee announced in the fall the formation of a special committee to review institutional planning, funding and facilities needs. [The Higher Education Special Study Committee - A Review of Institutional Planning, Management, and Funding of Facility Maintenance Needs by Public Institutions of Higher Learning](#) met from November through March. Members of the Committee included, Senator Thomas Alexander, Co-Chairman, Senator Nikki Setzler, Co-Chairman, Senator John Matthews, and Senator Kevin Bryant. A committee was also convened by the House Ways and Means Committee to review K-16 building and facility needs and utilization. The special committee is chaired by Ways and Means Chairman Brian White. He is joined on the committee by Representatives Roland Smith, Gilda Cobb-Hunter, Chip Limehouse, Kenny Bingham, Jim Merrill, and Jackie Hayes. In April, the special committee, [House Ways and Means K-16 Building Need And Utilization Study Committee](#), held its initial organizational meeting and then met again on May 23. It is anticipated that the committee will continue to meet in the off-session. At the May 23 meeting, the committee heard from Budget and Control Board staff, Carol Routh, who spoke to the capital planning process. At future meetings, CHE, the State Treasurer, and others are expected to be invited to address the committee. The committee, which has held one prior organizational meeting in April, is expected to work during the interim and make recommendations for legislation that could be considered in the upcoming session.
