### **Background Information**

The Department of Sociology, Anthropology and Criminal Justice is seeking approval for changes to the BA in Sociology to introduce flexibility and access for students within the curriculum and its disciplinary coursework, reduce the total number of program credit hours, and eliminate the program's criminal justice emphasis area.

In Fall 2013, the first semester covered by our modern student information system, our BS and BA Sociology programs enrolled over 200 students, approximately a third of whom pursued an emphasis area/concentration in criminal justice. Subsequently, the Department has undergone a number of changes that include the Fall 2016 introduction of a new major in criminal justice. The growing criminal justice major alone now (as of Fall 2019) enrolls over 200 students. Given the success of this major, and the university's recent approval of a new criminal justice minor, the emphasis area within the Sociology BA is no longer necessary.

With these changes to the size and student makeup of the baccalaureate Sociology programs, whose enrollment has dipped to a still healthy 140 students as of Fall 2019, updates to the curriculum are necessary. We are proposing changes that would benefit BA Sociology students by allowing them to take more courses within their areas of interest and by deepening their knowledge within the discipline. The proposed curriculum changes would also allow students more flexibility to study abroad, double major, and pursue internship, co-op, and other professional development activities. These changes align with the University's Clemson *FORWARD* strategic priority of increasing opportunities for student academic engagement. Furthermore, a streamlined curriculum could attract more students changing their major or pursuing a second major to our Sociology baccalaureate programs.

The proposed changes to the BA Sociology are:

- 1) Reduce the required number of credit hours for the BA in Sociology from 121 to 120.
- 2) Remove the requirement that students must complete an advanced English course.
- 3) Broaden the course options within the general sociology emphasis area, and add three credit hours to each emphasis area.
- 4) Allow students to select between the currently-required quantitative research methods course and an alternative qualitative methods course for their second methods requirement.
- 5) Remove the requirement that students must complete additional departmental arts and humanities courses beyond those required for general education, and instead build in an opportunity for them to earn credit toward their degree for four semesters of modern language (instead of the two semesters of credit currently allowed).
- 6) Delete the criminal justice emphasis area.

Where currently required courses are eliminated, they are replaced with electives if not otherwise specified above. All of these changes are designed to streamline and simplify the Sociology major in order to allow students more flexibility in their programs and, therefore, to improve time to degree and provide students more opportunities to participate in opportunities that align with the engagement goals of the Clemson *FORWARD* plan.

### **Assessment of Need**

Over the last couple of years, the Department of Sociology, Anthropology and Criminal Justice has conducted numerous focus groups with graduating sociology majors and has learned that students find our requirements to be

overly complicated. Focus group participants have expressed that they would like flexibility to study abroad or pursue second majors, but feel restricted by curriculum elements that include very specific course menus required to meet degree requirements. They have also told us that there are experiences and courses that would be very beneficial to their academic careers and professional goals that they have had to forego because of the specificity of our extant curriculum, which requires courses to be very carefully timed in order to fulfill requirements.

Furthermore, comparison of our sociology curriculum to that at six similarly-ranked public land grant institutions demonstrates that our curriculum is the most complex, with our program both having the most restrictive course requirements within the major and allowing the fewest elective credits. For instance, all of the other programs allow students to complete between 18 and 24 hours of sociology electives, while our current curriculum allows, at most, 9 hours in this category. The proposed changes bring our requirements in line with competitive programs and support improved time-to-degree and greater opportunities to participate in professional engagement.

These goals are accomplished through the following curriculum modifications:

- Trimming 15 credit hours of requirements from outside of our department (additional arts and humanities courses) and replacing them with major electives, general electives, and prerequisites for required language courses. This will allow students to take more sociology classes to deepen their knowledge within the field, enhance their career preparation, and provide more elective slots for engagement opportunities.
- Explicitly adding the first two semesters of a modern foreign language to the curriculum rather than assuming that these credits will be earned by other means (e.g., credit by examination) or fulfilled via “elective” slots.
- Adding flexibility for students by allowing them to choose between a quantitative or a qualitative course for their advanced research methods requirement rather than specifying a quantitative methods course.
- Replacing specific menus of courses within the general sociology emphasis area with sociology electives to allow students to take major classes that better fit their goals and interests.

These changes reduce the total number of required credit hours from 121 to 120, which is in line with that of other social science majors (including anthropology, criminal justice, psychology, and political science) in our academic college.

As mentioned above, we also plan to delete the Criminal Justice emphasis area because demand for it has dropped with the introduction of the criminal justice major three years ago. At that time, there were about a dozen criminal justice majors and approximately 65-70 BA and BS sociology majors pursuing an emphasis area in criminal justice. Today, however, there are over 200 criminal justice majors, while there are currently only six sociology majors with an emphasis in criminal justice (four of whom are scheduled to graduate this year). Given the further addition of a newly approved criminal justice minor that will go into effect in Fall 2020, the emphasis area is no longer necessary.

### Description of the Program

The BA Sociology program is a four-year degree that, under the proposed modification, will require 120 credit hours of coursework—or approximately 15 credit hours per semester for eight semesters—including at least 34 credits in sociology or rural sociology. At least 12 of the 34 credits must be from 4000-level sociology or rural sociology courses. Coursework includes core sociology requirements (e.g., Research Methods, Theories), general education classes, modern language requirements for the BA, electives, and courses within the emphasis area/concentration and required minor. As mentioned earlier, emphasis areas include General Sociology, Community Studies, and Social Services (with the deletion of the Criminal Justice emphasis); each student completes 18 semester hours within his or her selected emphasis area.

Students may enter the program during any semester, and there are multiple cohorts following different catalog years enrolled at any one time. Sociology majors typically take general education and introductory courses within the major and minor, as well as modern language requirements, during their freshman and sophomore years, followed by advanced courses within their major, minor, and emphasis area during the junior and senior years. Interested students may complete internships, research experiences, Creative Inquiry projects, or study abroad trips as their schedules and interests allow.

*Explain how the enrollment projections were calculated.*

For this enrollment model, the starting 2020-2021 data is assumed to be similar to that for 2019-2020, which is characterized based upon information gathered from Clemson’s Banner student information system; this mirroring assumption is reasonable given that (as of 14 January 2020), admission applications to our sociology programs are running a few students higher than last year, admissions offers are running a few students less, and confirmed acceptances of admissions offers are flat.

The tables above reflect student enrollment in the BA Sociology program. New incoming and outgoing student projections reflect averages from the last three years of departmental advising data regarding numbers of students participating in freshman and transfer student orientation, changing their majors, and graduating. These projections also incorporate 3% growth each year starting in 2021-2022 since we are anticipating that our streamlined curriculum will attract more students (especially double majors and students changing their major). A slow, steady growth will allow for efficient and effective management of the program.

#### **New Courses**

The following are courses that are new to the BA Sociology curriculum, but are extant offerings at the University:

The 1010 and 1020 level courses in a modern language are introductory classes that prepare students for the required intermediate level courses in their selected foreign language. These classes were previously considered prerequisites for BA Sociology students instead of required courses.

Sociology electives may be any sociology courses not taken to fulfill core or emphasis area requirements. Specific institutions and processes requirements in the general sociology emphasis have been replaced with these electives. Furthermore, an additional sociology elective has been added to each emphasis area. Four general elective credits have also been added under the proposed curriculum.



SOC 4060, Qualitative Research Methods for the Social Sciences, may be used to meet the advanced research methods requirement under the proposed curriculum. (Currently, Research Methods II, which has a qualitative focus, is required. SOC 4060 would be a new option for BA students.) This course provides an introduction to qualitative research methods, design and analysis for the social sciences. Methods covered may include interviews, focus groups, observation, visual analysis and content analysis. Students learn about validity, reliability, trustworthiness, ethics and the uses of social science qualitative research in a variety of applied settings.

The proposed changes will likely produce a slight increase in enrollment in sociology courses, while decreasing slightly the demand for classes within Clemson’s arts and humanities disciplines. **Budget Justification**

The program leverages current teaching capacity in the existing program and will need minimal, existing resources to support the requested program modifications. The enrollment projection is based on 3% growth per year, as are the tuition projections. The budget above reflects a continuation of current revenues and expenses.

**Revenue Highlights:**

- **Reallocation of Existing Funds<sup>1</sup>:** The program uses current undergraduate tuition at \$544 per credit hour. Reallocated resources are approximately \$109K in Year 1 and \$124K by Year 5. The program will utilize reallocated resources to support the existing faculty and staff salary and fringe at an average of \$10K per course as listed in the Expense Highlights.

**Expense Highlights:**

- **Program Administration and Faculty and Staff Salaries:** The reallocated resources will be used to support the existing faculty and staff salaries at a cost of \$10K plus fringe per course. The personnel costs are approximately \$109K in Year 1 and \$124K by Year 5. These are the only costs associated with the program modification. Due to the nature of the changes, this is the only cost associated with the modification.
