# General Eligibility Requirements

**SC HOPE, LIFE & Palmetto Fellows Scholarship**

**SC Need-based Grant**

**Lottery Tuition Assistance**

- US Citizen/Legal Permanent Resident\*
- SC Resident\*
- No felony convictions
- No second or subsequent alcohol/drug misdemeanors
- Not in default of any state or federal loans
- Enroll in a degree-seeking program at an eligible SC institution

*\*this must be determined at the time of high school graduation.*

# State Scholarships and Residency: Basic Breakdown

Students must have their immigration status verified through a federal process as either a US Citizen or legal permanent resident before they can be awarded any State scholarship.

Students must be verified by the institution as a SC resident before they can be awarded any State scholarship.

A student who is NOT verified as a US Citizen or legal permanent resident **AND** who is not verified as a SC resident at the time of their high school graduation cannot receive State scholarships at the time of initial enrollment or at any point in the future.

# SC HOPE Scholarship

## Eligibility:

3.0 Cumulative GPA (based on the SC UGP) upon high school graduation

<p>No application Process. Institution reviews final high school transcript.</p>	<p>Must attend an eligible SC 4-year institution</p>	<p>Up to \$2,800 For the 1st academic year only (2 terms)</p>
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# LIFE Scholarship

## Eligibility at a 2-year institution

- 3.0 Cumulative GPA (based on the SC UGP) upon high school graduation

## Eligibility at a 4-year institution

- **Earn 2 of the follow 3 requirements**
  - 3.0 Cumulative GPA (based on the SC UGP) upon high school graduation
  - 1100/SAT or 24/ACT
  - Rank in the top 30% of the graduating class

# LIFE Scholarship

## Terms of Eligibility

- Up to 4 consecutive semesters of eligibility at a 2-year institution
- Up to 8 consecutive semesters of eligibility at a 4-year institution

## Up to \$5,000 per academic year

- Not to exceed to the Cost of Attendance
- Must attend an eligible SC institution

# Palmetto Fellows Scholarship

## PFS: Application Periods

- Any eligible student will need to be a part of the Early or Late Award application process during their year of graduation
  - TWO opportunities to apply:
    - Early Award: Mid-October- December 15<sup>th</sup>
    - Late Award: Mid-April-June 15<sup>th</sup>
      - Should the deadline fall on a Saturday, Sunday, or holiday the deadline is the preceding Friday.
- \*a student cannot use Early Award documentation for the Late Award\**
- \*\*a student cannot apply or earn the PFS once they have graduated high school\*\**
- Counselor driven application process
    - The application and application materials must be submitted via the high school/home school association and in the Commission office by the established deadlines (listed above)

# Eligibility Requirements

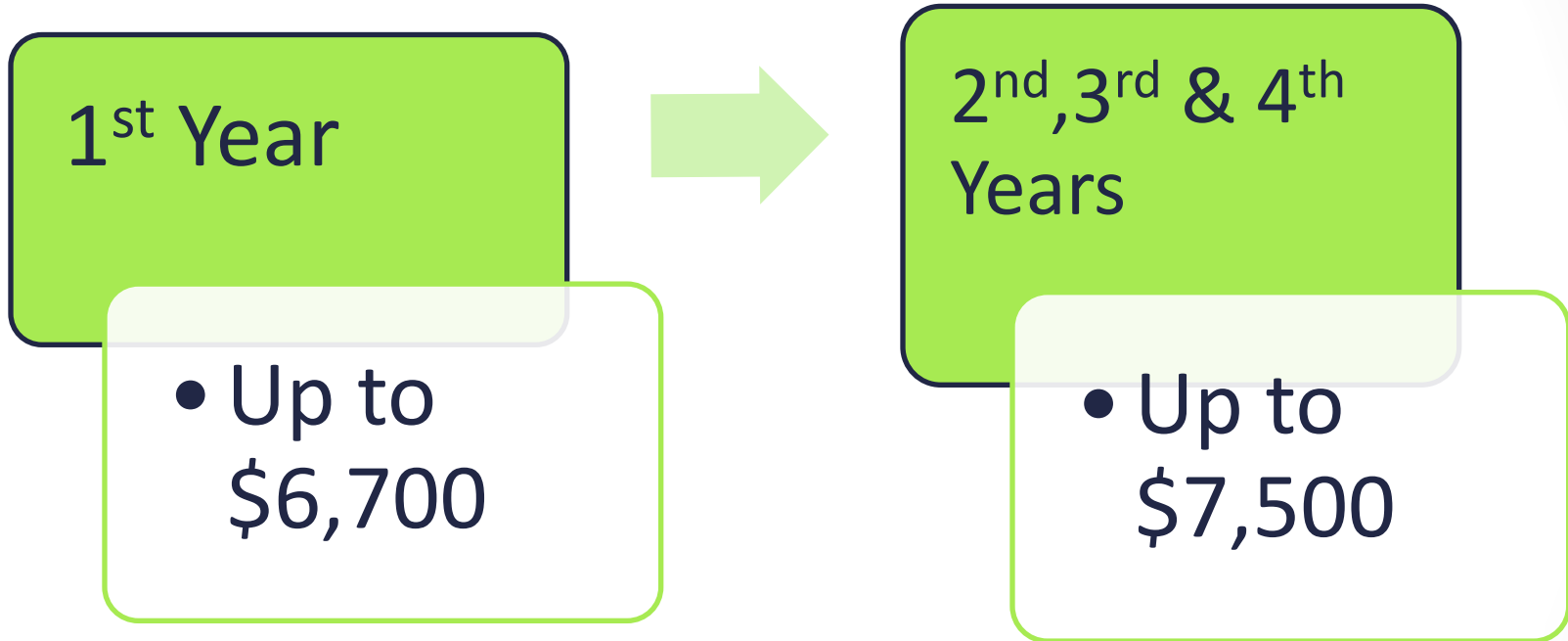
- For schools that have an official policy on rank that has been reviewed by the Commission for compliance with the established Regulations:
  - Rank in the top 6% at the end of the 10<sup>th</sup>, or the 11<sup>th</sup>, or the 12<sup>th</sup> grade academic year
- Earn a 1200 on the SAT/27 on the ACT (through the June test administration of the graduating year)
- Earn a 3.5 cumulative GPA (based on the SC UGP)

**OR**

## **Alternate Criteria** (without regard to rank)

- Earn a 1400 on the SAT/32 on the ACT (through the June test administration of the graduating year)
- Earn a 4.0 Cumulative GPA (based on the SC UGP)

# Important PFS Points

- The student **MUST** attend an eligible 4-year institution the fall semester immediately following high school graduation
  - Enrolling in a 2-year institution during a fall or spring semester forfeits the student's PFS eligibility
- A student who attends an out-of-state institution can use any remaining terms of the PFS should they transfer to an eligible SC institution and meet the PFS renewal requirements
- In order for the student to receive scholarship funds they **MUST** complete the DESIGNATION FORM
  - This is the SOLE responsibility of the student
  - The student is provided this form via email to the email listed on the electronic application

# LIFE & PFS Enhancements

Must be enrolled in an eligible major at their home institution

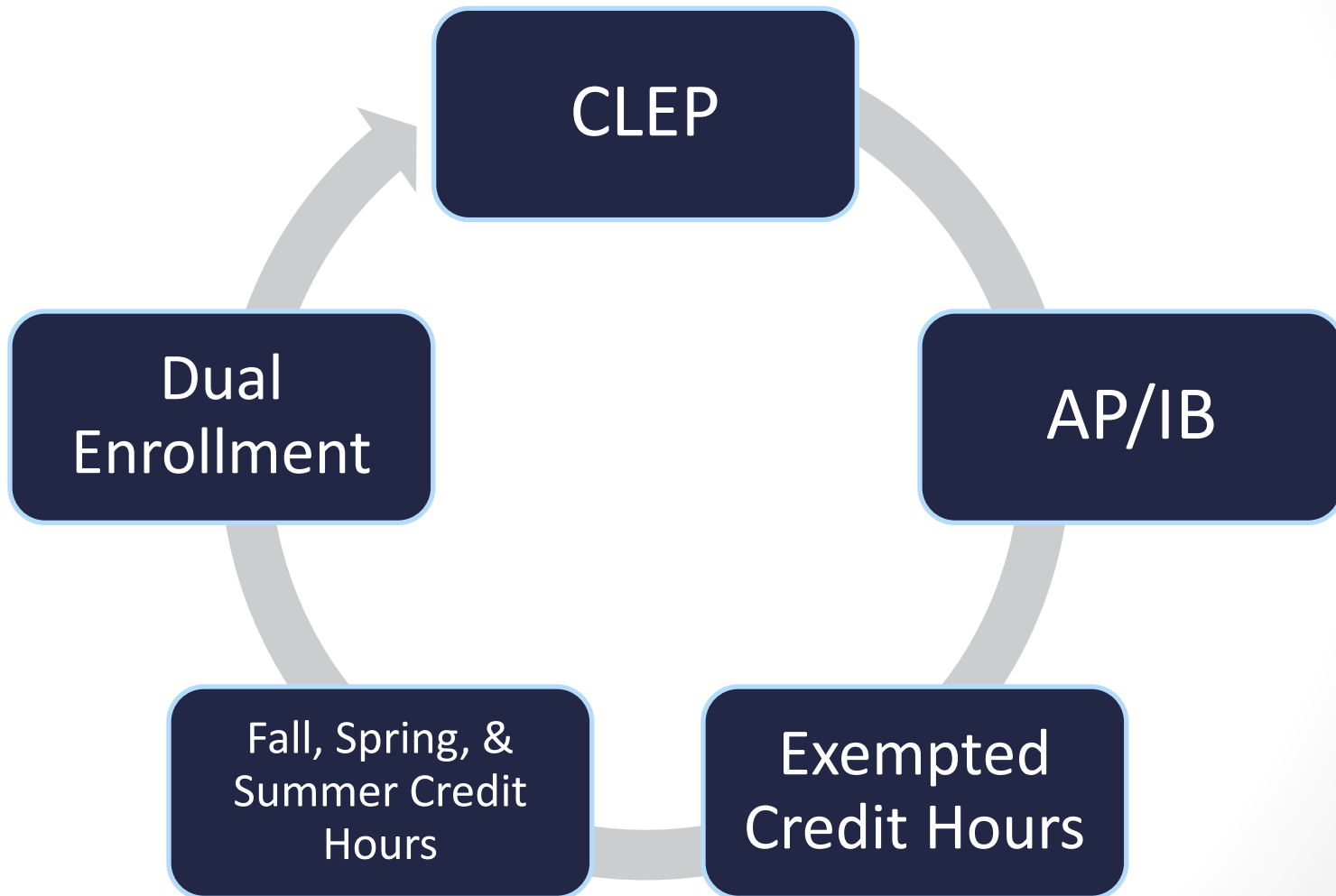
Must Earn 14 credit hours of math and/or science by the end of the 1<sup>st</sup> academic year

Starts the student's 2<sup>nd</sup> academic year (6 semesters) at a 4-year institution only

Up to an additional \$2,500

# General State Scholarship & Grant Information

- No State Scholarships or grants may be used at an out-of-state institution at any time
- Academic Common Market
  - Allows for South Carolina residents who are enrolled in specific programs at out-of-state institutions to be charged only the applicable in-State tuition by the institution in which the student is enrolled

- Graduation Bulletin/Program
  - If the school chooses to designate scholarship recipients in such programs, we would ask that you include the following disclaimer language:
    - ***"The designation of scholarship recipients on this program or in any media is preliminary, based on information provided by the high schools and students at the time of this printing, and is subject to final confirmation and approval by the eligible higher education institution and/or the South Carolina Commission on Higher Education."***

# SC Need-based Grant

Must complete the FAFSA application each year and be determined “needy” based on Title IV

Can be used at any 2-year or 4-year public institution.  
Must be considered a Degree seeking student.

Up to \$2,500 for full time or \$1,250 for part time. Eligible Foster Care Youth may receive additional funding.

# SC High School Transcripts

## **ALL transcripts must identify SC UGP GPA**

Since all state scholarships and grants are based on the SC UGP, **all transcripts must specifically state “SC UGP.”** Any transcript that states, “Weighted and Unweighted GPA” OR “Total GPA” will not be accepted for the purposes of awarding state scholarships as it must comply with the **SC UGP.**

# SC High School Transcripts

## SC High Schools

- All final transcripts must be date calculated between the date of the high school graduation (May-June) and **no later than June 15<sup>th</sup>**
- The final grades/ranking cannot include grades earned after the official graduation date of the school year. Summer school grades earned after high school graduation cannot be used in the calculation. The final, official transcript must be in compliance with the policies set forth by the SC Department of Education. According to the SCDE, final transcripts must not state “Work In Progress.”

# SC Public High School Transcripts- Powerschool

- All issues regarding the ability to print transcripts should first be referred back to the high school or School District IT Department. If the issue cannot be resolved at that level, the school can then contact the SC Department of Education Power School Administrator.



# SC Independent/Private/Home School Association Transcripts

- All transcripts being used for scholarship eligibility must demonstrate the SC UGP GPA on the transcript
- All final transcripts must be dated between the date of the high school graduation (May-June) and **no later than June 15<sup>th</sup>**
- If the school/ home school association ranks its students as a policy, rank must be demonstrated on the transcript
- Rank must be on the transcript if there is a rank policy and students are using rank. Transcripts would need to demonstrate the following:
  - Student ranks 3 out of 112
  - Class Rank: 2<sup>nd</sup> out of 56
  - Rank: 1 of 20
- No numerical GPA's, transcript would need to demonstrate the following:
  - Need to state the SC UGP is being utilized
  - Totals/Averages cannot be used- a Cumulative GPA would need to accompany a numerical total or average

# Out-of-State High Schools

- If you have a student who attended an out-of-state high school and wishes to be eligible for any State scholarship:
  - Out-of-state schools must comply with SCUGP GPA reporting and ranking
    - For those schools that have a grading scale that substantially deviates from the SC UGP, the Commission would need to be contacted
    - If using rank, the entire graduating class must be converted to the SCUGP and a ranking report that reflects the SC UGP rank conversion must be included

# Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA)

“On June 15, 2012, the Secretary of Homeland Security announced that certain people who came to the United States as children and meet several key guidelines may request consideration of deferred action for a period of two years, subject to renewal, and would then be eligible for work authorization.

Deferred action is a discretionary determination to defer removal action of an individual as an act of prosecutorial discretion. Deferred action does not provide an individual with lawful status.”

# DACA (continued) – Q&A Updated

## 1/18/13

- **New - Q6: If my case is deferred, am I in lawful status for the period of deferral?**

A6: No. Although action on your case has been deferred and you do not accrue unlawful presence (for admissibility purposes) during the period of deferred action, deferred action does not confer any lawful status. The fact that you are not accruing unlawful presence does not change whether you are in lawful status while you remain in the United States. **However, although deferred action does not confer a lawful immigration status, your period of stay is authorized by the Department of Homeland Security while your deferred action is in effect and, for admissibility purposes, you are considered to be lawfully present in the United States during that time.** Apart from the immigration laws, “lawful presence”, “lawful status” and similar terms are used in various other federal and state laws. For information on how those laws affect individuals who receive a favorable exercise of prosecutorial discretion under DACA, please contact the appropriate federal, state or local authorities.

# DACA Continued

- We have received inquiries recently concerning individuals with status under the federal Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA). SC Code of Laws §59-101-430 requires that state institutions must verify immigration status with the federal government and institutional personnel do not have the discretion to independently verify immigration status for any student including those presenting with DACA.

# DACA Continued

- With respect to the state-supported scholarship and grant programs each program regulation includes language that requires in-state residents eligible to receive scholarships and grants to be a legal permanent resident of the US before they can be awarded.
- If individuals are not in receipt of a Green Card, they will not be eligible to receive in-state resident classification or the state scholarships or grants.

# What does this mean?

- Students may attend an eligible South Carolina institution once their status has been verified and confirmed by a federal process.
- Students will not be eligible to participate in the State scholarship programs\*, the SC Need-based grant program, or Lottery Tuition Assistance program
- Students will be charged at out-of-state rates
  - Should the student become a US Citizen/legal permanent resident they will be able to work with their home institutions in respect to in-state rates.
- Institutions are only verifying the student's lawful presence. The institution is not involved in determining a student's citizenship or legal permanent residency status.

*\*At no time will a student be eligible to participate in the State scholarship programs should their US Citizenship/legal permanent residency status be determined **after** they graduate high school*
