AGENCY'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

Creation of Agency

The South Carolina Commission on Higher Education (CHE), established in 1967, serves as the coordinating board for South Carolina's 33 public institutions of higher learning. In addition to partnering with institutions to deliver an effective statewide higher education system, the CHE acts both as an oversight entity on behalf of the General Assembly and an advocate for the citizens of South Carolina as they seek postsecondary education opportunities to improve their lives and those of their families.

Composition of the Commission

The CHE is governed by a board of 15 members appointed by the Governor pursuant to South Carolina Code \$59-103-10. There are four statewide at-large members, with one appointed as chair; one member from each of the state's seven Congressional Districts; three members who serve as college and university trustees representing the public research institutions, four-year comprehensive teaching institutions, and technical colleges; and one non-voting ex officio member who is a sitting president of an independent college and represents the independent higher learning institutions. Members representing Congressional Districts are appointed by the Governor upon recommendation of a majority of the senators and representatives comprising the District's legislative delegation. The remaining members are recommended and appointed on the advice and consent of the Senate. Commissioners serve four-year terms with the exception of the institutional representatives who serve two-year terms. All members continue to serve until a replacement is named.

Commissioners currently serve on one or more of four standing committees: the Committee on Academic Affairs and Licensing, the Committee on Access & Equity and Student Services, the Committee on Finance and Facilities, or the Committee on Strategic Initiatives and Engagement.

Ascend 60x30 - The Agency's Public Agenda

In February 2021, the CHE adopted its Public Agenda Implementation Plan, titled "Ascend 60x30," which has two overarching objectives:

- by 2030, 60 percent of South Carolinians have a high-quality post-secondary credential
- close and eliminate achievement gaps by 75%

CHE staff have been implementing policies and programs to achieve the public agenda's objectives. In FY 2022-23, staff continued initiatives targeting improving access to higher education including increasing the Free Application for Federal Financial Student Aid (FAFSA) completion rate, increasing access to dual enrollment, and coordinating seamless transfer and articulation between public institutions of higher learning. Other related activities include strengthening the state's workforce through the distribution of funding for a Nursing Initiative to help attract and retain nursing faculty at public institutions across the state.

Office Functions

Internally, the CHE is divided into seven agency offices: the Office of the President and Executive Director; the Office of Internal Operations and Administration; the Office of Academic Affairs and Licensing; the Office of Strategic Initiatives and Engagement; the Office of Student Affairs, the Office of Fiscal Affairs, and the Office of Data-Management and Information Technology. Below is a summary of each office's responsibilities:

Functions of the Office of the President & Executive Director (OPED)

Commission on Higher Education Meetings Staff of the OPED facilitate CHE meetings along with the Commission's Executive Committee meetings. The OPED ensures that meeting agendas and materials are distributed to Commissioners, stakeholders, and the public and that records are kept of held meetings. The OPED also serves Commissioners by providing training and other resources.

Council of Presidents and Council of Board Chairs The President & Executive Director ensures the convening of regular Council of Presidents meetings and provides orientation and training for incoming chairs of the council and provides educational or topical resources for discussion and deliberation by the council. The President & Executive Director serves as a voting member of the council. The President & Executive Director also ensures the convening of regular Council of Board Chairs meetings and provides educational or topical resources for discussion and deliberation by the Council.

External Board Service The President & Executive Director serves on various boards and committees for the CHE's state partners including the Coordinating Council on Workforce Development; the University Center of Greenville; the Governor's School for Math and Science; the Governor's School for Arts and Humanities; the SC Tuition Grants Commission; Interagency Collaboration Committee (affiliated with First Steps); Cybersecurity Workforce and Education Working Group (DEW); and the State Chamber of Commerce Education and Workforce Development Committee.

Customer Service Staff of the OPED provide customer service to constituents by greeting guests and answering the agency's main telephone line among other administrative services.

Functions of the Office of Internal Operations and Administration (OIOA)

Internal Operations Staff of the OIOA handle non-fiscal related internal operations for the entire agency. This includes providing legal support to agency leadership and the Commission Board, approving procurement requests, developing the agency's internal operating budget, liaising with the Department of Administration human resources team, and developing and ensuring compliance with agency and state policies. During FY 2022-23, the agency finalized an employee handbook, which serves as a compendium for agency internal policies and procedures, focused on reducing paper records to increase office space for additional employees, and began pursuing software solutions to improve employee efficiency. In addition, Internal Operations staff developed and distributed four new internal agency policies.

Permanent Improvement Projects One of the statutory responsibilities of the agency is to review and provide recommendation to move forward with permanent improvement project plans submitted by public higher education institutions. Staff review and analyze the project submittals, which are then vetted by the Committee on Finance and Facilities and the full Commission. During FY 2022-23, the Commission held nine meetings and recommended 65 projects for approval. In addition, staff reviewed and processed changes to 169 projects, which included reviewing requests to change funding sources, closing an open project after all expenditures posted, or other similar procedural requests for which the Commission granted authority to staff to review.

Comprehensive Permanent Improvement Plan (CPIP) The CPIP includes an institution's permanent improvement projects anticipated or proposed over the next five years. The CHE is charged in statute with reviewing all the CPIP submittals from public institutions and prioritizing the projects. For the 2022-2023 CPIP, CHE staff classified projects related to their primary purpose, such as maintenance or renovation, and prioritized projects planned for fiscal year 2023-24 into four different priority tiers. In addition, staff provided information on the capital renewal needs of institutions over the next five years.

Educator Preparation The CHE works with the SC Department of Education to approve programs related to the preparation of teachers and other school professionals, and on national initiatives through the Council of Chief State School Officers. The CHE oversees the Center for Educator Recruitment, Retention, and Advancement

(CERRA) and professional development. Additionally, the CHE partners with the State Higher Education Executive Officers (SHEEO) organization and private institutions to increase the number of African American males pursuing education degrees to work in the teaching profession.

EIA Centers of Excellence The Centers of Excellence is a competitive grants program conducted through the CHE. Grantees establish a resource center related to the improvement of teacher education. Each three-year grant enables centers to concentrate on assisting low-performing schools and districts by providing training and support to teachers in those schools and districts. Since the first Center of Excellence was funded in 1987, over 30 different centers have received funding across South Carolina. During FY 2022-23, CHE staff managed six Centers of Excellence grants. With the grant funding, the centers convened 81 professional development workshops on issues such as college and career readiness and promoting teaching as a profession and presented on best practices at two state or national conferences.

State Approving Agency (SAA) The State Approving Agency is a federally-funded program that oversees education and training programs for veterans in South Carolina. SAA staff are responsible for approving and disapproving programs at postsecondary institutions where veterans or their dependents receiving GI Bill benefits are enrolled. In addition to program review, SAA staff perform audits and site visits to ensure the institutions comply with state and federal rules. As of May 31, 2023, 8,810 veterans or their dependents receiving GI Bill benefits were enrolled in South Carolina institutions of higher learning.

Research This area provides agencywide support answering questions related to higher education policy and issues. The team performs qualitative and quantitative analysis that informs agency leadership and the Commissioners. In addition to modeling trends related to higher education data, the research team provides insight on other important areas such as economic and financial forecasting.

Legal Counsel The deputy director and general counsel provides legal advice to the President & Executive Director, agency staff, Commissioners, and higher education constituents. Additional functions include reviewing any external communication that relies on a legal interpretation, involvement in regulatory and statutory drafting, and responding to Freedom of Information Act requests.

Functions of the Office of Academic Affairs and Licensing

Academic Program Review The CHE must approve all new academic programs proposed by a public institution before those programs can be offered to students. The CHE fulfills this statutory responsibility by considering new program proposals at regularly scheduled meetings throughout the year. Staff review and analyze institutional proposals comparing the new programs to other offerings in the state to minimize duplication. In addition, staff verify the local and industry need for potential graduates of that discipline. In FY 2022-23, 31 new academic degree programs were approved by the Commission. CHE staff reviewed and approved institutional proposals to modify—by changing curricula, concentrations, or sites — 44 academic degree programs, and institutional proposals to terminate 42 programs, concentrations, certificates, or sites.

Program Productivity The CHE ensures that academic programs offered by public colleges and universities are effective, relevant to the economy, and do not unnecessarily duplicate existing program offerings. This is achieved, in part, through a biennial review of bachelor and graduate degree programs' productivity based on enrollment and number of degrees awarded during the review period.

Licensing The CHE is the sole authority for licensing nonpublic postsecondary institutions operating or soliciting in South Carolina. Licenses are both site and program specific. The CHE licenses degree- and non-degree-granting institutions, which may be for-profit, non-profit, or out-of-state public institutions. In FY 2022-23, the CHE licensed 99 institutions operating in 120 locations. In 2022-2023, 5,443 students were enrolled at licensed, degree-granting postsecondary institutions in the state. The CHE also serves a consumer protection role for students enrolled at licensed institutions. During FY 2022-23, CHE staff responded to six complaints filed against licensed and exempt institutions. The CHE also provided support for students who were impacted due to the closure of licensed institutions. In addition, the CHE serves as a repository for student records from closed institutions. During FY 2022-23, CHE staff processed 101 transcript requests from students seeking verification of education.

State Authorization Reciprocity Agreement (SARA) SARA is a voluntary, interstate reciprocity agreement that establishes comparable standards for interstate offerings of postsecondary distance education. Its member states

and U.S. territories recognize each other's participating institutions as eligible to enroll students in distance education programs. The CHE is the portal agency for SARA in South Carolina. During FY 2022-23, 47 South Carolina institutions participated in SARA, including 13 from the Comprehensive and Research sectors, 12 from the Technical College System, 18 from the Independent sector, and 4 from the private-for-profit sector. SARA participating institutions save an average of \$69,797 each year. SARA institutions pay between \$3,351 and \$11,221 for initial authorization. The average estimated amount these SARA institutions would be required to remit to obtain initial authorization to offer interstate distance education programs if they did not participate in SARA is \$219,000. Since becoming SARA participants, South Carolina institutions have experienced a cost savings in authorization fees and reduced the difficulty of securing authorization from each state in which the institution offers online courses.

SmartState The SmartState program is a collaboration between industry, academia, and government. As required by statute, operational support, staff, and approval of all necessary funds for the operation of the SmartState Program Review Board is provided by the CHE. Since its inception in 2002, SmartState has awarded \$197.6 million to South Carolina's three research universities, which has been used to establish and operate 51 Research Centers of Economic Excellence. In 20 years, the program has had a \$3.9 billion economic impact, including creating more than \$1.2 million in labor income for South Carolinians that may not have existed otherwise. As of June 30, 2023, the SmartState program has attracted more than \$2.9 billion in non-state investment and aided in the creation of 19,465 jobs with salaries averaging at least \$75,000 a year.

Southern Regional Education Board Programs (SREB) The Academic Common Market (ACM) and the Regional Contract Program (RCP) are two SREB initiatives that provide access to academic programs not offered in a student's resident state. These programs provide in-state tuition to students enrolled in programs offered by institutions in participating SREB states. Since 1949, South Carolina's membership has provided tuition savings for residents in health professions, including optometry and veterinary medicine, through the RCP. During the 2022-2023 academic year, 180 South Carolina students were certified for participation in the RCP and 99 South Carolina students were certified in the ACM program, resulting in significant out-of-state tuition savings for each of those groups if accepted and enrolled. A member of the Academic Affairs and Licensing staff serves as the SREB state coordinator, trained to help determine student residency and program eligibility, and to provide guidance and services to in-state and out-of-state residents interested or enrolled in the programs.

Functions of the Office of Strategic Initiatives and Engagement (OSIE)

The Office of Strategic Initiatives and Engagement drives the pursuit and attainment of strategic goals established by the CHE and General Assembly, with an emphasis on focused initiatives leading to tangible and timely outcomes. OSIE programs providing agency-level support include Legislative and External Affairs and Strategic Communications. The office also orchestrates programs dedicated to *Ascend 60x30* attainment, including Workforce Development, College Completion, and Transfer and Articulation.

The OSIE staff led the development and management of the inaugural Transfer Convening. Approximately 140 higher education professionals and leaders participated, representing 42 institutions of higher education, including independent, public four-year, and public two-year schools. The OSIE hosted a legislative breakfast which led to substantive discussions among CHE Commissioners, staff, and General Assembly members and staff. The OSIE also collaborated with South Carolina Independent Colleges and Universities (SCICU) and the South Carolina Technical College System to jointly plan all aspects of the second annual Higher Education Day held in April at the State House, which drew participants from independent, technical, and public colleges. Approximately 100 students from more than 30 institutions attended the Governor's keynote address and Higher Education Day proclamation reading.

Communications One of the OSIE's roles is to build internal and external awareness of the Ascend 60x30 strategy. This purpose facilitates a deeper understanding of the value of higher education attainment, and highlights progress toward milestones and goals. The Communications team is responsible for aligning external CHE messaging with the strategic plan. To effectively communicate the strategy, the team may employ means including (but not limited to) media engagements, press releases, social media, organizational website posts, messages from the President, internal and external newsletters, targeted correspondence with stakeholders and informational papers/fact sheets. In FY 2022-23, the communications team issued 12 press releases to external media which contributed to 36 media placements. The agency received a total of 60 media mentions over the fiscal year. Across agency social media platforms, combined reach totaled 99,459 for the FY. The agency also generated significant growth

in followings on Facebook (31percent) and LinkedIn (54 percent). Communications staff took responsibility for the build-out and administration of the CHE's new website which launched in August 2022. The site generated more than 308,000 visits within the observed period- the most heavily trafficked page was "Scholarships and Grants" with 73,000 visits. The communications team also wrote and published 15 agency news articles to the website during the FY.

Transfer and Articulation Planning, development, and implementation of designated Ascend 60x30 projects and goals, with emphasis on transfer and articulation, are also responsibilities of OSIE. Current projects include implementing Proviso 117.135, which authorizes the CHE to implement the Transfer Action Plan. The plan includes, but is not limited to, building consensus of a statewide agreement to ensure credit applicability, development of a transfer library of core courses and learning outcomes, and the creation of a statewide reverse transfer agreement. A statewide Transfer Council collaborates with the CHE in the implementation of those projects. Future initiatives may include programs to award credit for prior learning experience or military service or competency-based education, co-requisite courses, dual enrollment/dual credit/early college opportunities, and degree maps and degree-completion pathways.

South Carolina Transfer and Articulation Center (SC TRAC) The CHE developed SC TRAC to enable students to locate information related to transfer and access agreements. SC TRAC helps students save both time and money by facilitating the transfer of courses between institutions and by helping students better plan their degree completion progress. In FY 2022-23, the SC TRAC website had a total of 407 student accounts created, which allows students to track their transfer credits and create equivalency maps. Additionally, South Carolina public colleges and universities added 186,847 new and adjusted course equivalencies and 11 new articulation agreements. Course equivalencies are existing courses at other South Carolina public postsecondary institutions that the institutions deemed as equivalent to the course the student took at the original South Carolina public postsecondary institution. Since the site's launch in April 2010, there has been over a 1,000-percent increase in course equivalencies between the institutions (555,260 at launch compared to 6,419,082 at the end of FY 2022-23).

College Completion The OSIE leads efforts to increase readiness, persistence, and completion of college-going students, especially first-generation college-going students, low-income students, and other underrepresented groups. In partnership with the State's public and independent postsecondary institutions, the OSIE provides a statewide perspective about college readiness, persistence, and completion goals and strategies. The office assists with collecting data and reporting measurable progress on established college readiness, persistence, and completion initiatives, such as academic completion pathways and developmental education; leads selected initiatives designed to improve college completion rates; and participates in the planning, development, and implementation of other *Ascend 60x30* projects and goals.

Legislative and External Affairs The Legislative and External affairs manager supports and advises the agency in all matters regarding state legislative and regulatory issues and priorities. The manager communicates with the executive and legislative branches of government, governmental agencies, postsecondary institutions, and community organizations, as needed. Legislative and External Affairs also identifies and monitors legislative and regulatory activity, assists with the agency's budget requests, and facilitates development of agency policy recommendations. The Legislative and External manager provided 12 legislative updates during the 2023 legislative session while also responding to direct requests for information from legislators throughout the session. Other tasks included researching and responding to constituent requests as the agency's ombudsman for constituent concerns.

Workforce Development The OSIE promotes the role and impact of postsecondary attainment on economic and workforce development throughout the state. The office helps ensure that postsecondary education course offerings are aligned with workforce needs and requirements and serves as the primary intermediary among the CHE and other workforce-relevant government agencies, businesses, and other statewide organizations. The OSIE leads strategic workforce development initiatives, such as strategies to boost the healthcare and educator workforces and represents the CHE with external agencies and committees on workforce and economic developments. The office is the lead liaison for CHE with the Coordinating Council for Workforce Development (CCWD), which was strengthened and re-defined by Act 67 of 2023. The office presents postsecondary's contributions to the development of Act 67's Unified State Plan and is also responsible for special projects such as implementing legislative directives including the Educator Preparation Report Card and the Nursing Educator report.

Functions of the Office of Student Affairs

Palmetto Fellows Scholarship (PF) The PF is the highest monetary scholarship awarded in the merit-based programs. Full-time in-state students receive \$6,700 their freshman year and \$7,500 their sophomore year through senior year. In addition, students majoring in science, technology, engineering, or mathematics (STEM) programs are eligible for an additional \$2,500 annual award. Staff create and disseminate the PF application to high school counselors and receive completed student applications to determine scholarship eligibility. During FY 2022-23, CHE staff reviewed 3,626 first-time applications for PF eligibility, an increase of 219 applications. Staff maintain all data, manage transfer requests, monitor students' continued eligibility status, and update the statewide database. Additionally, staff promulgate regulations and work with the South Carolina General Assembly to draft legislation affecting this and other scholarship programs. For the 2022-23 academic year, South Carolina institutions awarded \$55.4 million in Palmetto Fellows Scholarship funding to 8,836 eligible recipients.

LIFE and HOPE Scholarships LIFE and HOPE scholarships are two merit-based scholarships available to residents attending eligible institutions in South Carolina. LIFE scholars receive \$5,000 per year, which includes a book stipend. In addition, students majoring in a STEM field are eligible for an additional \$2,500 award. HOPE scholars receive \$2,800, which includes a book stipend, only for their freshman year. The LIFE Scholarship may be used at two- or four-year institutions, while the HOPE Scholarship may be used at eligible four-year institutions only. Staff host annual trainings with institutional financial aid officers from around the state to ensure the programs are implemented accurately at each institution. Additionally, staff work with high school counseling personnel to train them on the scholarship requirements and assist students, families, and institutions with eligibility questions or concerns. For the 2022-23 academic year, South Carolina institutions awarded \$182.4 million in LIFE Scholarship funding to 40,326 eligible recipients and awarded \$11.4 million in HOPE Scholarship funding to 4,817 eligible recipients.

Lottery Tuition Assistance Program (LTAP) LTAP funds are awarded to eligible students at two-year institutions, including high school students attempting college-level coursework through dual enrollment programs. Award amounts are up to the cost of tuition of public two-year institutions after accounting for all other federal and state aid. CHE staff work with institutions and students to ensure scholarship requirements are understood. For the 2022-23 academic year, South Carolina institutions awarded \$54.6 million in LTAP funding to 46,012 eligible recipients.

Scholarship Appeals Students may file an appeal with the CHE to retain or regain a scholarship due to an extenuating circumstance after being notified of ineligibility by the institution. Upon receiving an appeal, staff review documentation, verify student GPA, prepare a case file, and make a determination based upon the information received. Upon receiving a negative decision, students may subsequently file an additional appeal to a nine-member committee consisting of one or more members from the following groups: legislators, CHE commissioners, school district superintendents, representatives from the public and private sectors, and local business leaders. Staff provide the committee members training on eligibility, review criteria, and student case files. The decision of the committee is final. During FY 2022-23, CHE staff processed 195 appeals for the Palmetto Fellows, LIFE, and HOPE Scholarship programs and the appeals committee adjudicated 18 appeals.

Need-Based Grant (NBG) The South Carolina NBG program provides funding for the state's neediest students. These funds are available for students attending eligible two- and four-year institutions in South Carolina. The award amount is up to \$3,500 per academic year and is awarded based on the results of the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). CHE staff determine the grant funding that each institution receives each year by formula, while the institutions determine the actual award amount an eligible student may receive. The funding is awarded on a first-come, first-serve basis, based on the submission date of the completed FAFSA by the student. Students participating in an eligible College Transition Program (CTP), as well as eligible foster care youth, can receive additional NBG funding. CHE staff are responsible for working closely with the five CTPs, the South Carolina Department of Social Services, and higher education institutions to ensure appropriate awarding. During the 2022-23 academic year, 39,162 students participated in the NBG program, an increase from \$7,687 students the previous year. These students received \$75.4 million in NBG funds, an increase from \$68.1 million in the 2021-22 academic year because of an increase in funding provided by the General Assembly.

South Carolina National Guard College Assistance Program (CAP) The CAP provides financial assistance for eligible South Carolina Air and Army National Guard members. Staff, in coordination with the South Carolina National Guard and college and university representatives, maintain the CAP database to confirm and verify

eligibility for CAP awards, process invoices from eligible South Carolina colleges and universities, and provide regulatory guidance regarding the program. Due to Proviso 117.143 of the FY 2022-2023 Appropriations Act, a member of the SC National Guard may qualify for college assistance program grants for more than 130 semester hours or related quarter hours. In addition, the maximum program benefit increased from \$18,000 to \$22,000. During the 2022-2023 academic year, 914 students received CAP, a 22 percent increase from 749 students the previous year. Students received \$3.8 million in CAP funds, an increase from \$2.9 million compared to the 2021-2022 academic year.

College Goal South Carolina College Goal provides an opportunity for students and their guardians to receive free assistance in completing and submitting the FAFSA, a necessary step for students to receive federal and state, and in some cases, institutional, financial assistance. Staff update and administer the registration process for College Goal South Carolina events through the SCCANGO.org website, design promotional materials, recruit institutions as sites for College Goal, host meetings to provide training to institutions, and develop manuals for students and families to use as guides through the financial aid process.

College Application Month South Carolina (CAM) The goal of CAM is to provide a forum for all South Carolina seniors to complete and file college applications. Staff perform similar activities as the College Goal program but with the focus on helping students complete and submit college applications instead of the FAFSA. In FY 2022-23, 244 high schools registered to hold College Application Month programs and 21,340 students received assistance. Based on post event surveys, an estimated 36,844 college applications were completed at College Application Month events during the season.

College Decision Day South Carolina College Decision Day is a program that celebrates college decisions of graduating high school seniors. CHE staff recruit and provide support to high schools each year to host College Decision Day events across the state. For the Spring 2023 semester, 53 individual high schools hosted College Decision Day events in South Carolina.

In May 2023, the CHE held its second annual College and Career Decision Day event at the State House. The event brought together over 1,300 high school seniors from various areas of the state, representation from 28 higher education institutions, members of the South Carolina General Assembly, the State Superintendent of Education, and the Governor for a celebration of high school graduation and their decision to enter college, join the workforce, or enlist in the military.

Functions of the Office of Fiscal Affairs

Agency Finances The Office of Fiscal Affairs (OFA) is responsible for the CHE's financial and operational resources, which is approximately \$11.4 million for agency operations, with an additional \$470 million in passthrough funds. This responsibility includes allocating and distributing various funds appropriated for higher education. Tasks include accounts payable and receivable, budget management, auditing lottery scholarship expenditures by institutions, grant management for three federal grants, and all other activities to ensure compliance with federal and state laws.

Lottery Funding Administration The OFA manages and distributes lottery funding to higher education institutions. These funds include the state's need-based grants, merit scholarship programs, and other types of student financial assistance. In FY 2022-23, OFA distributed over \$383 million in lottery funding. Because the State Treasurer's office distributes lottery funds quarterly, OFA staff reconcile and track funding requests and ensure the timely receipt of lottery funds to institutions for their effective operations. In addition, OFA staff annually calculate the need-based grants distribution to each institution and forecasts the scholarship and grant need funded by the Lottery Fund each budget cycle.

Scholarships Compliance Proviso 3.1 of the annual appropriations act requires verification and audit by the CHE for the expenditure of lottery funds. Per the proviso, institutions must be reviewed on a rotational schedule, not to exceed three years. During FY 2022-23, OFA staff completed seven audits that resulted in seven findings related to eligibility and disbursement amounts. As a result of the findings, staff identified \$12,500 in funds that have been reimbursed to the lottery account.

Data – Commission on Higher Education Management Information System (CHEMIS) Established in 1991, CHEMIS is a data management system that stores and processes data of the postsecondary institutions in South Carolina. Institutions submit data using a secure file upload process on key areas of higher education throughout the academic year. The data submitted to Office of Data-Management and Information Technology (ODMIT) staff by institutions of higher education in South Carolina include enrollment, state scholarship, and Pell grant records; degrees awarded; aggregated course information; and facilities, faculty, and tuition abatement records. Using data uploaded by the institutions to CHEMIS, the ODMIT staff facilitate institutional data submission as required by the U.S. Department of Education Federal Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) for the purposes of Title IV funding.

In addition, ODMIT staff use the data from CHEMIS to perform analyses, respond to stakeholder requests, and serve as a data source for a variety of reports the CHE produces. This includes required reporting to regional and national bodies, internal staff, researchers, partner agencies, and the General Assembly. On May 16, 2023, ODMIT began a project to upgrade the CHEMIS data system. The modernization of the application will provide a better end-user experience and promote self-service. Additionally, there are several business processes that will be enhanced and ODMIT will use new business intelligence technology to improve usability and accessibility of the data.

Shared Services South Carolina has established a series of statewide information technology (IT) standards as part of the development and implementation of the IT shared services model. To comply with the standards, the CHE entered into an agreement with the South Carolina Department of Administration, Division of Technology Operations (DTO), which allows the CHE to participate in the shared services platform. The agreement also allows the CHE to comply with the State's IT policies, procedures, guidelines, and standards. The CHE completed its IT migration to the DTO shared service platform on August 6, 2019. The DTO shared services platform allows the agency to leverage resources that the CHE does not have access to as a standalone agency. The CHE now has access under the shared services model to enhanced security and privacy protection, and a host of skilled system engineers. The migration to the shared services platform has yielded significant cost savings for software, desktops, laptops, and server hardware and maintenance.

The South Carolina Commission on Higher Education's Statistical Abstract ODMIT staff develop the South Carolina Higher Education Statistical Abstract, which is a comprehensive, single-source compilation of tables and graphs that reports data frequently requested by the governor, legislators, college and university staff, other state government officials, and the public. The intent of the publication is to provide timely data concerning higher education in South Carolina. The Statistical Abstract includes the most recent statistics on enrollment, degrees awarded, faculty, graduation rates, facilities, tuition and fees, funding, and other factual data.


Risk Assessment and Mitigation Strategies

If the agency were not able to complete its regulatory and statutory duties or outreach initiatives, tens of thousands of South Carolinian students and families would be severely impacted. The greatest risk is not being able to provide adequate scholarship and grant funding to students so they may attend postsecondary institutions and better their lives. This includes students not receiving proper information about scholarship and financial aid opportunities, such as the requirement to complete the FAFSA. To mitigate this risk, all CHE staff were instructed to complete standard operating procedures as part of their employee performance management system planning for fiscal year 2022–23. Creation of the standard operating procedures and additional cross-training across employees and offices also has allowed the agency to continue functioning and managing its duties when confronted by turnover.
